At this time much of the parish, away from the Avenue, was still farmland. Frederick, son of George Millard, labourer at Coldharbour Farm, and his wife Mary was baptised on 22nd May. The farmhouse (above) was situated between the present locations of Seaforth Gardens and Amberley Gardens.



Anna Stuttaford, widow of former Churchwarden William Foot Stuttaford, died. The family had lived at Clevelands, later St Michael's, on the corner of Cleveland Road and The Avenue.

This photograph shows the house towards the end of its time as the St Michael's Home for older people, run by a Convent of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary.



Also this year:

Mrs H Williams became the Mothers' Union enrolling member (branch leader) for Cuddington, serving until 1926.

The endowment reached £6,400.

Stained glass windows in the Children's Chapel showing St Mary with the infant Jesus; St Michael; and the Archangel Gabriel, were given in memory of William Foot Stuttaford and his wife Anna.



A pair of stained glass windows was installed in the south clerestory, showing Dorcas and Lydia; it was given in memory of Emily Fairbank.

Miss Fairbank was one of the sisters of Alick Thomas's wife, and had lived with another sister and brother-in-law at St Katharine's, later numbered as 40 The Avenue (Suffolk Road was later built on the site of the garden of this house).

During her lifetime Miss Fairbank had made numerous gifts to the church, including burses and veils for chalices, alms bags, and a brass ewer for the font.

Hilda Smith, daughter of Dr William Chearnley Smith of Elm Lodge (above), which was later incorporated into the premises of Worcester Park Baptist Church and subsequently replaced by new church halls, was married to Thomas Spittle on 16th April, and Reginald Gill, son of the publisher George Gill publisher who lived next door to Dr Smith at Wavertree (later replaced by Purdey Court) was married to Linda Mase on 1st December.

The service register records that collections were held in January support of Belgian victims of the war, and that later in the month a service was attended by members of the Athletes' Volunteer Force.

1915

The AVF was formed by sporting journalists in London ten days after the outbreak of war, recruiting cricketers, cyclists, footballers, rowers, athletes, golfers and swimmers, who were not eligible for the regular army or any other recognised force; it was designed for home defence, rather than active service.











Above right: Sir Alexander Harris, former Churchwarden, became Governor of Newfoundland.
