


Right: Hymn-book shelves were made by Glyn Smith, later a Churchwarden and chalice assistant (seen here at work on another project).



The Revd Harvey Pentreath oversaw a programme of redecorating the church, including having the chancel ceiling painted blue, and colour added to the surround of the reredos. The Father Willis organ was remodelled, with a solid-state action replacing the tracker action, and the console moved to the nave.

A festival weekend was held including flower festival. Canon Idwal Jones, former Vicar, returned to preach during the weekend, and is shown here (centre, right) in conversation with Harvey Pentreath.






Above: the Cuddington Players performed Salad Days for the second time. George Goddard is seen here (in white apron) at work on constructing the set.

An ecumenical procession of witness to Auriol Park.


The first Funday was held in Shadbolt Park.
